

ON THE WAY.....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

The experts anticipate that we will need to practice social distancing for a few more months. The possibility of opening up the Church for all will be a moment of celebration. A question arises though: will people come back? Or maybe a better question: what do we need to do to encourage people to come back? For Catholics, the "sun and center" of the spiritual life is the Eucharist. People will come back to gather around the table of the Lord and share once again in the Eucharistic Banquet. Last week we looked at how Jesus gave the gift of the Eucharist at the Last Supper. This week we want to examine how the early church responded to the command of the Lord: "Do this in remembrance of me."

In the Gospel of Luke two companions (Mr. and Mrs. Cleopas?) encounter the Risen Lord on the road to Emmaus but they did not know who it was. It is only at the end of their journey when they gather for a meal that they "recognized him in the breaking of the bread" (Luke 24:35). The memory of Jesus' doing that at the Last Supper to distribute the first Eucharist was strong enough for them to realize that they were in the Real Presence of Jesus in the breaking of the bread. The Acts of the Apostles continues that same memory when it speaks of the early community. They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer (Acts 2:42). Breaking of bread had become a way of speaking of the Eucharistic celebration. Those earliest believers were, of course, all Jews and they continued in their traditional Jewish prayers and practices, even going to the temple to worship. The "breaking of the bread" was their way of establishing an identity specifically as followers of Jesus. Since there were no churches (nor even thoughts of churches at this point) for believers they "broke bread" at home. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God (Acts 2:46). Temple was where they prayed as Jews but breaking the bread of the Eucharist made them Christian.

St. Paul was instrumental in broadening the followers of Jesus to include Gentiles, that is, non-Jews. The practice of "breaking bread" as the preferred way of gathering as Christians continued among the gentile communities. Apparently, the custom developed of having a meal after the Eucharistic celebration and the Apostle chides the Christians in Corinth because their practice violated the very meaning of the Eucharist. I hear that when you come together as a church, there are divisions among you, and to some extent I believe it...one person remains hungry and another gets drunk... When you gather to eat, you should all eat together (1 Corinthians 11:18,21,33). For St. Paul the experience of Eucharist which should have been the moment of greatest unity among the Christians was

the source of division and, thus, a scandal. This early experience of the Church continues to challenge us to have our Eucharistic Celebrations be a true reflection of a genuine experience of community.
