

ON THE WAY.....

May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

Our patron, Saint James, was one of the twelve apostles. A first century Jewish fisherman he was one of the earliest followers of Jesus. He inspires us to become like him in fishing for those who are in need of the grace and mercy that Jesus offers. Over time, many legends accumulated around St. James. One of the most unusual is that St. James was the "moor slayer," Santiago Matamoros in Spanish. The background: Muslim invaders from North African, known as the Moors, conquered the Iberian Peninsula in the 711AD and were only stopped from invading France at the Battle of Tours in 732AD. After that battle the local Muslim leaders lost their expansionist tendencies and were content to govern Spain while the Christians huddled in the northwest part of the country. Then began the centuries long process of the reconquest (the Reconquista) with Christian rulers gradually pushing the Moors out of Spain and Portugal which did not culminate until 1492. The figure of St. James figured prominently in the mythology of the Reconquista.

The story is this: the Christian king in 842 was Ramiro of Asturias. In Christian circles, the legend grew that St. James had gone to Spain, founded the Church there, and provided protection for the Christians. (How much of this is history and how much legend is debated up until today.) Old bones that were discovered in what is now Santiago de Compostela were and are venerated as his relics. The legend was that a battle took place which shifted the balance of power. When the previous king died, the Moors demanded of Ramiro the reinstatement of the tribute of 100 virgins (fifty noble and fifty commoner). Ramiro denied them the tribute and prepared for battle. On the night before the Battle of Clavijo, he dreamt of St. James, who told him that God had chosen James as the patron for the Spanish kingdoms. According to the legend, James appeared as a warrior on his white horse with a white banner to help Christian armies of King Ramiro I in a battle against the Moors. The Christians marched on the cry of *¡Dios ayuda a* Santiago! "God save St. James!". They slew more than 5000 Muslims and James became known as "Matamoros". A strange title for a fisherman from Galilee.

One tragic side effect of this description occurred when the Spanish began their sixteenth century invasion of the Americas. They associated the native peoples with the Moors and thus felt entitled to slaughter the indigenous population. They justified their actions since they were bringing Christianity to the savages. You can't help but imagine that St. James would think this was messed up.

The supposed tomb of St. James at Compostela became, and still

is, a major pilgrimage site. Because of this, St. James is the patron of pilgrims, a title which seems more compatible to our spirituality that "the Matamoros." On our pilgrimage of faith let's honor St. James as our spiritual companion for the journey.

and out of joy goes and sells all that he has and buys that field." (Mt 13:44)


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Live The Liturgy Inspiration of the Week
