ON THE WAY....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

This year we celebrate the shortest Advent possible – only twenty-two days. Right after the Fourth Sunday of Advent Darren, Dan and crew will transform the Church for the celebration of Christmas Eve. There is an ancient tradition that celebrates Christmas Eve (it used to be Midnight Mass) since, according to St. Luke, Jesus was born during the night watch of the shepherds. This is not just a historical detail but has symbolic significance as well. Night in the ancient world (before electricity and argon street lamps and neon signs) was uncertain and dangerous. St. Paul, for example, instructed us to walk as "children of the light" since night can be the domain of dark forces that threaten human existence. Jesus being born at night demonstrated his dominion over powers which threaten us.

There is another aspect of night as well. Night is the time of silence and waiting. During sleep at night we replenish our strength to prepare for another day. Night is the time of dreams, and in the Bible, dreams can come as revelation from God. Jesus is portrayed in the gospels as spending the night in prayer as the best time to converse with God undistracted by the stuff of the world. The Psalmist says "Yours is the day, yours also is the night" (Psalm 74:16). So the night has both negative and positive aspects in the Bible. Night is looked upon as the time of possibility – but the outcome of a possibility that is ambiguous.

Probably the most popular Christmas Carol is "Silent Night, Holy Night." Though originally written in German the song has been translated so every corner of the world sings it. In doing so we capture the possibility that is present in this child born at night. The Bible tells us the birth of Jesus took place at night it does not report the date. December 25th was chosen as the date for Christmas. The first official mention of December 25 as a holiday honoring Jesus' birthday appears in an early Roman calendar from AD 336. Church officials wanted the date to coincide with existing pagan festivals to show the superiority of Christianity over their religion. Coming as it did during the shortest days in the northern hemisphere, the pagan festival celebrated the "unconquered sun god," that the sun would return to brighten the world in the coming weeks. For the Church, Jesus enlightens our way through the darkness of error and sin and celebrating his birth during the darkest days of the year recognizes that fact.

All of which reminds us of how we are to celebrate Christmas. On this silent night, holy night our hearts must be quiet, recollected, and open to the possibility of existence whatever it may lead. Instead of our usual preoccupation with planning and controlling how things turn out, on Christmas night we are preparing ourselves to be surprised by the new thing God is doing. Who could have imagined that God would share in human life in all its messiness! Christmas invites us to trust in the divine wonder that will be our present as the night yields to a new day in God.




Please plan on attending our New Year's Eve Brunch from Polo Café which will be held on Sunday 12/31/23 directly after Mass, downstairs in the church hall. This
