

ON THE WAY....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

Beginnings and endings. The liturgical year of the Church begins on the First Sunday of Advent. Instead of talking about beginnings, the scripture readings for the day talk about endings, the end of time when God will be all in all. There is something about a beginning which puts one in mind of endings. This brought to mind an ancient symbol: the snake eating its own tail called the ouroboros. Eternity is captured in the beginning which includes an ending. This symbol was first seen in the tomb of King Tut!

The Greeks and then the Medieval alchemists also used the symbol. Norse mythology and Hindu theology all reference the ouroboros. In modern times the psychologist Carl Jung looked on it as a primal archetype. The physicist, August Kerkule, said that the image inspired his recognition of the benzene ring's structure. Even the Bible talks about Leviathan with echoes of the ouroboros. TV shows The Wheel of Time and Loki both picture the symbol. So for centuries a snake eating his own tail has served to challenge the linear view of time which is the ordinary way of thinking.

Of course the church in joining together beginnings and endings is not thinking of snakes but of the plan and action of God. We aren't being whipped about through the winds of change. God has been at work from the first moment of creation and will continue until the final consummation. The season of Advent reminds us that the seeming small beginning at Bethlehem was the next step in the divine drama which we call salvation history. The Jesuit paleontologist and mystic, Teilhard De Chardin, looked on the coming of Christ as an inflection point leading to the unfolding of the end, the Omega Point. We only understand the birth of Jesus by seeing it as leading to the ultimate triumph in the kingdom of God. It is unfortunate that society has coopted the season of Advent for commercial purposes. It robs us of the opportunity to situate the coming of Christ in the context of the ultimate triumph of God. Romantic images of baby and mother are not an end in themselves but meant to awaken us to the unfolding of the divine in human affairs. Advent invites us to lose any nostalgia for what happened two thousand years ago and instead see those events as leading to God at work today and, yes, into the ultimate future. As the Bible puts it, "Jesus Christ is the same vesterday, today, and forever" (Hebrews 13:8). Not a snake but a child shows us the

infinite possibilities opening up beyond time that we possess as the people of God.




